Year in review



UTS Gallery & Art Collection presents a rich and varied program of high-quality exhibitions, educational and engagement activities that contribute to the cultural life of the university and the wider community. Our programs demonstrate the value of the visual arts to everyday life, education, and technology, allowing our audiences to view, appreciate and interact with challenging and surprising concepts and innovations in the arts.

In 2020, UTS Gallery & Art Collection programs considered the environmental, the social, and the local. They supported Australian and international artists and designers working across contemporary art, fashion, architecture and design, with exhibitions, public programs, online events, new writing and major digital commissions.

Working in partnership was central to our success in collaborating across UTS and the broader community. In early March, we partnered with the Centre for Social Justice and Inclusion, the Faculty of Transdisciplinary Innovation, the Faculty of Science and Women in Engineering and IT, to celebrate International Women's Day. This program supported the launch of a new visual identity for the Equal Futures Athena

SWAN gender equity program at UTS. An exhibition of collages by artist Deborah Kelly, produced in workshops with UTS STEMM staff and students, was presented in the UTS Tower foyer.

Our programs then adapted to the global challenge of the coronavirus pandemic, with UTS Gallery closed from March – September, and a shift to online programming and work for the team.

The exhibition Fit For Purpose launched in February with partner events planned with Art Month Sydney, Golden Age Cinema and Sherman Centre for Culture and Ideas. Curated by Armando Chant, lecturer in the UTS School of Design, the exhibition brought together six international fashion designers and collectives with unique approaches to sustainable, ethical and collaborative design. With the onset of NSW restrictions, we quickly moved exhibition content online, prioritising accessible audio described resources.

In 2020, online programs became a meaningful way to support and connect with our audiences and community. A Moment in Time drew upon the power of art to connect us, shift our perspectives, and show us new worlds. Professional and teaching staff from across UTS were invited to reflect upon a work in the UTS Art Collection that resonates with them at this moment in time. Responses by Cherine Fahd, Eve Cheng, Larissa Berendt, Vice-Chancellor Attila Brungs, UTS Librarian Michael Gonzalez, Dean of Law Lesley Hitchens, Verity Firth, Cameron Tonkinwise and Heidi Norman were shared on social media over nine weeks.

UTS Gallery and Studio A presented Dancing Together, a participatory online program that invited audience members to join a one-on-one dance-off with Studio A artists. As these artists shifted to work from home, away from their shared studio practice, they found ways to connect through conversation and dance online. Participants chose their favourite song and danced with a select

teachers to explain concepts from different perspectives.

In June, the UTS Broadway Screen, a 12-metre long digital screen dedicated to digital art by Australian artists, was launched. The premiere program included new commissions by leading Australian artists Daniel Crooks, Grant Stevens, Patrina Munuḡurr and Ishmael Marika of The Mulka Project. Recent acquisitions include a significant video work by Daniel Boyd, with further commissions and acquisitions by artists including Cigdem Aydemir and Angela Tiatia to premiere from 2020-2022. The UTS Broadway Screen digital commissions speak to the diversity of perspectives and experiences of the UTS community and respond to the site as a busy city pedestrian corridor and as an entryway to a centre of knowledge exchange. The UTS Art on Campus website gives audiences further insight into select works and includes artist interviews and information.

With the easing of restrictions in September, UTS Gallery re-opened with Cloud Studies, the first solo exhibition in Australia by Forensic Architecture. Forensic Architecture is a UK-based research agency comprised of architects, artists, filmmakers, journalists, scientists, lawyers and other specialists who undertake investigations into human rights abuses, state violence and environmental crimes worldwide.

The exhibition included related investigations and a publication, Responses to the Cloud, that explored the themes of Cloud Studies from a local context. As part of our commitment to accessibility, audio recordings of these texts read by their authors were published online, and audio-



group of Studio A artists (Emily Crockford, Meagan Pelham and Victoria Atkinson), led by studio A artist-in-residence Rosie Deacon twice weekly.

We also continued to serve our learning audiences through online resources for U@Uni Academy secondary students. 300 stage 4 and 5 secondary students used an online module positioning Joyce Hinterding's work Floric Antenna 1 – Orange Lichen Study as the central reference point in teaching aspects of the curriculum for Science, Technology, Mathematics and Visual Arts for stages 4 & 5 high school students. Compiled by STEAM educators with input from academic staff from Science and FEIT, the resource exemplified the creative work of artists in exploring, collaborating and working across disciplines and the opportunities this provides for

described tours were available on request. This program continues our ongoing partnership with the UTS Centre for Social Justice and Inclusion.

2020 also saw an organisational change for the UTS Gallery & Art Collection team as we farewellled Curator Tania Creighton. After twenty years of producing exhibitions, leading art policy and developing the UTS Art Collection, Tania Creighton leaves behind a considerable legacy at UTS. The Watters Gift was the final project Tania developed for UTS and is a testament to her dedication to art and artists. The Frank Watters gift included major artworks by artists Richard Larter, John Peart, Ruth Waller, Chris O'Doherty and Euan Macleod. The Frank Watters gift is the single largest artwork donation to the collection in our thirty-year history. UTS Gallery & Art Collection produced The Watters Gift catalogue in place of a gallery exhibition. A curated display of selected works in the UTS Tower foyer by Richard Larter and John Peart highlighted the significance of this gift and the legacy for UTS.

In November, we launched the inaugural UTS Artist in Residence program (UTS AiR), recognising the wealth of knowledge and innovation at the heart of UTS research. UTS AiR is a fully-funded opportunity for NSW-based artists/collectives to create new work with the support of UTS research and facilities across disciplines. UTS AiR is a valuable opportunity for knowledge sharing and cross-disciplinary collaboration of mutual benefit to the artist and university research and recognises the vital role of the arts in fostering the economic, social and cultural prosperity of our communities. The UTS Artist in Residence program is generously supported by the Anita and Luca Belgiorno-Nettis Foundation and the UTS Faculty of Engineering and IT. In 2021, two UTS Artists in Residence will work closely with UTS researchers to support the creation of new work.

I want to thank our internal and external partners for their support during a challenging year that brought on many

changes. I also give my thanks to the artists, curators and designers we worked with across the year and to the UTS Gallery & Art Collection team and our colleagues across UTS for their resilience, imagination and collaborative spirit.

Fit for Purpose brought together six international designers and collectives whose work is driving change through explorative, sustainable, ethical and collaborative practices. Curated by artist, designer and lecturer in the UTS School of Design, Armando Chant, the exhibition included unique garments and shoes, process samples, patterns and sketchbooks together with video interviews with the designers.

The exhibition was accompanied by a commissioned essay by sustainable fashion expert Bandana Tewari.

Twelve events and public programs were scheduled, including partner events with Art Month Sydney, SCCI Fashion Hub and Golden Age Cinema & Bar. 6 events took place before the exhibition was closed prematurely on 13 March due to the Covid-19 lockdown.

The Watters Gift, via a publication and collection display, celebrated a significant donation of artworks to the UTS Art Collection from the late Frank Watters OAM. The 67 works in the gift were the largest donation in the collection's thirty year history. The publication, with a forward by Vice Chancellor Attila Brungs, reflected on Frank Watters' contribution to Australian art and his legacy in the UTS Art Collection.

UTS Ensemble in Residence, the Australia Piano Quartet, a sonic response to artworks in The Watters Gift focusing on works celebrating the Australian landscape. Originally planned as a live performance series, Soundscapes connected ensemble members across locations in a series of Youtube performances.

In lieu of a planned exhibition in UTS Gallery, a small selection of works was displayed in the UTS Tower Foyer while the campus was closed to the public in the continuing Covid-19 lockdown.

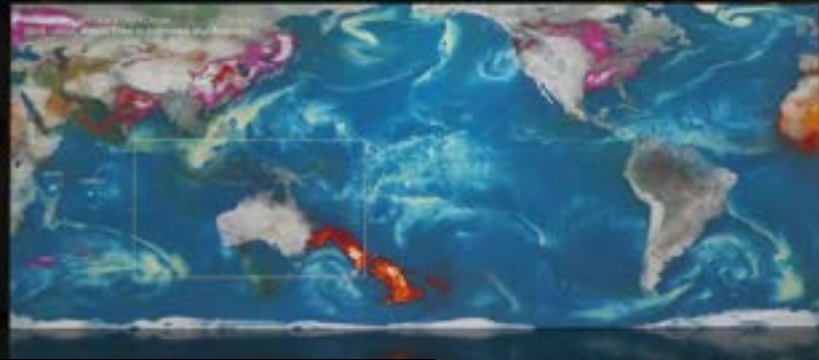

Cloud Studies

Forensic Architecture

Cloud Studies was the first solo exhibition in Australia by Forensic Architecture, a research agency comprised of architects, artists, filmmakers, journalists, scientists, lawyers and other specialists who undertake investigations into human rights abuses, state violence and environmental crimes around the world.

In Cloud Studies, Forensic Architecture contend with the interconnectedness of global atmospheres. The work brings together eight recent

investigations under a single theme; toxic clouds. In a year of bushfire, pandemic and protest, where toxic clouds colonise the air we breathe and shape the way we connect, Cloud Studies presented evidence of perseverance and resistance.

The exhibition was extended by related investigations and a publication, Responses to the Cloud, that explored the themes of Cloud Studies from a local context, with new writing by Joel Spring, Saba Bebawi, Jason De Santolo, Tom Melick, Nikki Lam, Thalia Anthony, Micaela Sahhar and curators Stella Rosa McDonald and Eleanor Zeichner.
